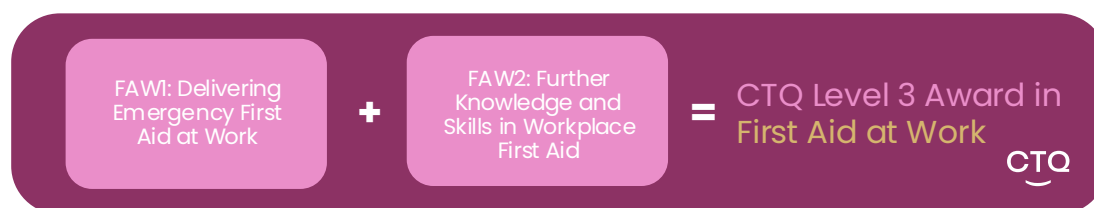

STRUCTURE OF THE QUALIFICATION

The Level 3 Award in First Aid at Work is made up of two mandatory units, which must be achieved to gain the qualification. There are no optional units.

BLENDED LEARNING

This qualification can be delivered using a combination of distance learning and face-to-face classroom learning and assessment. The 'minimum' amount of classroom hours must be as detailed below with the remainder of the GLH having been completed by distance learning:

NB There is no requirement for a separate assessor when delivering this qualification. Trainers can perform the role of both trainer and assessor providing they meet the below requirements for each role.

All Trainers, Assessors and IQAs must be approved by CTQ before working on this qualification. Each must hold the subject qualification at Appendix 4 and the relevant teaching, assessing or IQA qualification (or equivalent CPD training) at Appendix 5, keep an up to date log of their activity in that role, and provide evidence of CPD.

IQAs must also know the qualification's current requirements, understand the IQA role, observe delivery and assessment as part of sampling, and cannot quality assure a course they trained or assessed on.

RESOURCES, VENUE AND EQUIPMENT

Centres must use premises that are suitable, adequate and conducive to carrying out training and assessment, whether these are hired or in-house training rooms. They must also comply with all current legislation.

As a minimum, centres must make sure their venues, equipment and other resources include:

Teaching/training venue	The venue must meet acceptable health and safety standards and have sufficient: size, floor surfaces, seating, writing surfaces, toilet facilities, ventilation, lighting, heating, access, exits, cleanliness, absence of distracting noise. Tourniquet and cavity wound packs	Manufactured tourniquet packs: replica arm/leg or tube, manufactured tourniquet Improvised tourniquet packs: replica arm/leg or tube, sling, improvised windlass Cavity wound packs: replica arm/leg, gauze, trauma dressing
Hygiene	Sufficient procedures to maintain hygiene when using resuscitation manikins and other training equipment.

ASSESSMENT OF THE QUALIFICATION

ASSESSMENT STRATEGY

The Level 3 Award in First Aid at Work is assessed through a combination of assessments designed to test the appropriate skills, knowledge and understanding, as outlined below:

Appendix 1 & 2 sets out how the assessments are mapped to unit learning outcomes and content.

CONFIRMING IDENTITY

Assessments take place face to face at the training venue. Therefore, the responsibility of authenticating the learner's assessment evidence falls to the trainer/assessor. Trainer/assessors must check each learner's identity against approved photographic identification at the start of the course, such as:

- a government issued ID
- other photographic ID card, e.g., employee ID card (must be current employer), student ID card, travel card etc.

ASSESSMENT LANGUAGE

This qualification must be assessed in English due to the need for learners to be able to complete a 999 call and communicate with their patients.

Assessment in British Sign Language (BSL) **may** be permitted for this qualification for the purpose of a reasonable adjustment.

Prior approval from CTQ is required before any assessment is delivered through BSL. Approval must be obtained by completing a request for reasonable adjustment.

Any request received will be considered in terms of viability and there may be charges depending on the work required to meet the request.

ASSESSMENT DELIVERY

Assessments take place during training, practical assessments throughout, MCQ exams at the end. The qualification and its assessments are graded pass/fail only, with no higher grades available. Learners must pass every assessment to pass the qualification.

Externally marked assessments are marked automatically by the CTQ system, using pre-agreed pass marks.

Internally marked (practical) assessments are marked by centre assessors against CTQ's criteria, with results submitted to CTQ within 10 working days for EQA or certification.

ASSESSING PRACTICAL TASKS

Learners must be aware they're being assessed and demonstrate skills unprompted, without referring to course materials.

Assessors must give clear guidance and feedback, use the Practical Assessment Criteria document and complete the Evidence Log, assess only against the stated criteria, let learners complete tasks uninterrupted (unless safety requires stopping them), refer and reassess anyone who doesn't pass first time, and record the outcome.

Comments are expected for referrals only, outlining why the assessment decision was made.

ASSESSMENT REGULATIONS

Assessments take place during the training course, so extensions and late submission do not apply. Standard CTQ regulations for this qualification:

Referral on first attempt	Failing to meet the pass mark will result in a refer grade. INVIGILATION AND ADMINISTRATION OF EXAMINATIONS

Centres must administer and invigilate MCQ exams in line with the CTQ Controlled Assessment and Invigilation Instructions policy.

A learner may sit the MCQ on paper only for a reasonable adjustment or a technical failure. Trainers must ensure they have printed exam papers as a contingency for each course. Printed papers must be kept in sealed envelopes and stored securely.

Paper-based MCQs must be marked by the centre against the official mark scheme and are second-marked by CTQ.

STANDARD PERMITTED ASSESSMENT SUPPORT

Invigilators may also provide limited reading support during controlled assessments reading assessment questions and answer options aloud, verbatim in English where a learner cannot independently access written materials due to reading difficulty, language barriers, or other access needs.

This is permitted because the assessment tests first aid knowledge, understanding and practical competence, not reading ability or English language comprehension.

No prior CTQ approval is needed to use this support, but its use must be recorded on the invigilation report, and it must stay within the conditions set out in the CTQ Controlled Assessment and Invigilation Instructions policy.

CENTRE INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE

Centres are required to implement quality assurance measures to ensure reliability and consistency of assessment decisions. This includes standardisation and verification of assessment decisions. Standardisation means putting borderline cases to assessors through peer review, shadowing, or video-based training sessions so they agree on the assessment decision. Verification means observing assessors, in person or on video, and sampling their evidence, to check they're making decisions correctly.

HSE guidance requires centres to have: a quality assurance plan; a competent individual responsible for QA, independent of delivery; an annual assessment of trainer/assessor skills; a course evaluation procedure; a mechanism for learner feedback; a complaints procedure; and assessment records for each learner, retained for 3 years and available to CTQ on request.

QUALIFICATION INFORMATION

ABOUT THIS QUALIFICATION

This qualification is for anyone who has a specific responsibility at work, or in voluntary and community settings, to provide help to people in a range of first aid situations. Learners typically work in a setting where the risk assessment requires first aiders to complete First Aid at Work training, such as a high risk environment, or a workplace with over 50 staff.

A typical learner:

- is at least 16 years old
- is able to perform practical tasks at floor level
- has a minimum of Level 2 in literacy and numeracy or equivalent

QUALIFICATION PURPOSE

This qualification prepares learners for a first aid role in the workplace, covering the HSE training standard for First Aid at Work (FAW) delivery under the Health and Safety (First Aid) Regulations 1981.

It takes 18 hours to complete and must be finished within 10 weeks.

This qualification belongs to the CTQ suite of First Aid qualifications that includes:

- CTQ Level 3 Award in Emergency First Aid at Work
- CTQ Level 3 Award in First Aid at Work
- CTQ Level 3 Award in Emergency Paediatric First Aid
- CTQ Level 3 Award in Paediatric First Aid
- CTQ Level 3 Award in First Aid for Schools

These are all short qualifications mapped to HSE or DfE requirementsⁱⁱⁱ for first aid training.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Available to learners aged 16 or over. There are no formal entry requirements, though we strongly recommend a minimum of Level 2 in literacy and numeracy or equivalent. Due to the practical nature of the assessment, learners must be able to get to the floor unaided and demonstrate all required practical elements on their own, for example, effective CPR on a manikin at floor level for two minutes.

RECOGNITION OF PRIOR LEARNING

There are no opportunities for recognising prior learning to count towards this qualification.

PROGRESSION

Successful completion of this qualification enables learners to be workplace first aiders in emergency situations under the Health and Safety (First Aid) Regulations 1981.

Learners may also progress to related first aid qualifications, such as paediatric or forest school first aid.

REQUALIFICATION

This qualification is valid for a period of 3 years. Learners must retake before certificate expiry to remain qualified.

Annual refresher training is recommended by HSE, and learners should keep up with legislation and first aid best practice through ongoing CPD.

DELIVERING THIS QUALIFICATION

This qualification is delivered by CTQ's approved centres and consists of a mix of knowledge and practice. Blended learning combining e-learning and taught classroom sessions are permitted.

ENROLMENT, INITIAL ASSESSMENT AND QUALIFICATION REGISTRATION

Once a learner is enrolled on the course, the centre must carry out an initial assessment to confirm they're on the most suitable qualification and meet the entry requirements above, before registering them on the qualification.

At this point, centres must also give CTQ the dates, times and venues of the course running, so CTQ can carry out EQA activities to assure that assessments are being carried out correctly.

TIMESCALES FOR COMPLETION

Once enrolled, learners are expected to complete the qualification within 10 weeks in blocks of learning that are a minimum of 2 hours each.

CERTIFICATION

CTQ issues verified results and certificates to the approved centre, who forward them to learners. Learners should contact the centre if they haven't received these within 28 working days. Where a centre is sanctioned or withdrawn, CTQ reserves the right to send certificates directly to learners.

TEACHING THE QUALIFICATION CONTENT

HSE requires at least 18 hours' training and assessment (excluding breaks), over a minimum of three days, in sessions of at least two hours.

Centres must create their own delivery plan, checked at qualification approval, with a scheme of work covering the required content and learning outcomes within the minimum GLH, designed around learners' needs so they're ready for assessment, and identifying opportunities for formative assessment.

Suggested resources/textbooks are listed with each unit.

CENTRE ASSESSMENT STANDARDS SCRUTINY (CASS)

CTQ operates a risk-based model of ongoing monitoring, support and feedback for approved centres, combining a qualification risk rating and a centre risk rating to decide the frequency and type of external quality assurance (EQA) activity.

This qualification is rated **medium risk**.

Practical assessment relies on trainers/assessors being subject experts, assessed against the practical assessment criteria. To assure this, CTQ:

- Checks all trainer/assessors have the correct qualifications and experience at qualification approval
- Requires centres to notify CTQ of new trainer/assessors before they deliver or assess
- Monitors staff qualification expiry dates, and withdraws permission to deliver/assess if a qualification lapses
- Trains trainers, invigilators and assessors before they deliver the qualification

Because centre assessors make the assessment decisions, practical assessment is also subject to external verification:

- New centres and those with a high risk rating are monitored continually, including sampling assessment evidence
- Once CTQ is satisfied standards are being met, a centre's risk rating is reduced and it may mark and certificate without prior EQA sampling
- All approved centres receive a minimum of two interactions a year

NB Centres should allow for additional time for the issue of certificates where assessment decisions are being verified.

POLICIES

Delivery of this qualification must comply with all CTQ's policies including Reasonable Adjustments and Special Considerations, Enquiries and Appeals, Malpractice and Maladministration, Controlled Assessment and Invigilation Instructions.

UNIT SUMMARY

This unit will provide learners with an understanding of the role of the first aider and the skills required to provide emergency first aid for lower-risk workplace settings. Learners will have basic skills in providing first aid acting safely, promptly and effectively for choking; minor injuries; wounds; bleeding; casualties who are in shock, unconscious and/or in need of resuscitation.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

1	Understand the role of the first aider
2	Assess a range of first aid situations in order to provide emergency first aid
3	Provide appropriate first aid for a range of emergency situations and people

UNIT SUMMARY

Following on from FAW1, this unit provides learners with a comprehensive set of first aid skills covering most workplace environments. Learners will have skills in providing first aid acting safely, promptly and effectively for major bleeds, injuries to bones, muscles and joints, the spine, chest or eye, sudden poisoning and anaphylactic shock. They will know how to recognise the presence of major illnesses and provide appropriate first aid.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

2	Assess a range of first aid situations in order to provide first aid
3	Provide appropriate first aid for a range of situations and people

APPENDIX 4 – SUBJECT SPECIFIC QUALIFICATIONS FOR CENTRE STAFF

All Trainers, Assessors, Internal Quality Assurers and External Quality Assurers must have occupational knowledge and competence in First Aid.

This may be evidenced by:

- Holding an in-date **First Aid at Work** qualification issued by:
 - an Ofqual/SQA Accreditation/Qualifications Wales/CCEA Regulation recognised Awarding Organisation/Body
 - a Voluntary Accreditation Scheme (such as a recognised trade/industry body)
 - St John Ambulance
 - British Red Cross
 - St Andrews First Aid
 - Independently Recognised Training Centres
- Or a qualification at an equivalent or higher level to First Aid at Work qualification, which must be mapped.
- Or Current registration as a Doctor with the General Medical Council (GMC)^{iv}
- Or Current registration as a Nurse with the Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC)³
- Or Current registration as a Paramedic with the Health and Care Professions Council (HCPC)³

APPENDIX 5 – STAFFING REQUIREMENT – ACCEPTABLE EVIDENCE
